








Helping today's scholars create a promising future





Gearing up for the future

We partnered with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Puerto Rico on an innovative solution aimed at removing the barriers that prevent low-income youth from accessing a STEM-focused college education, with the ultimate goal of bringing youth out of poverty through employment. Participants explored STEM opportunities through career days and speaker series, science and technology clubs, and tutoring in math and English.

Going for the gold

Despite ongoing challenges posed by COVID-19, The University of the West Indies, Mona Campus, was determined to continue to engage primary and high school students in STEM subjects, specifically mathematics. We were proud to support this endeavor by sponsoring the university's annual Jamaican Mathematical Olympiad. This year 2,456 students from 68 schools participated in the Junior Mathematics Olympiad, and 737 students from 18 schools participated in the Senior Mathematics Olympiad.

Cryogenics curriculum heats up learning at UWI

For the LNG sector to be successful and sustainable, it's not enough to simply supply this energy alternative. We believe that educating and upskilling the next generation of LNG engineering professionals plays an integral role in this journey. That's why we are especially proud to have expanded our partnership with the University of the West Indies by introducing a cryogenics course to help position Jamaica to compete in the global LNG marketplace. This past year, 18 students participated in this exciting cryogenics program, in which we fully funded all prescribed texts, lab equipment, simulation software tools, and licenses, plus laptops.





With LNG being the future of energy, this is no doubt a milestone achievement for the UWI Mona in being the first tertiary institution in the Caribbean to offer a cryogenics engineering course for BSc engineering students.

Interns get up close and personal with LNG

This year in Jamaica, we welcomed our first engineering interns to our combined heat and power plant (CHP) in Clarendon, the Old Harbour power plant, and the Montego Bay LNG plant in Freeport. The internship was open to students enrolled in the cryogenics engineering elective at the University of the West Indies as part of their engineering degree, as well as engineering students at the University of Technology Jamaica and Caribbean Maritime University. It was aimed at helping aspiring engineers gain meaningful, practical, hands-on experience in the LNG field to become more competitive and more marketable as they transition into the workforce.









This internship has opened my eyes to how amazing working in the LNG industry can be. I have not had a dull moment since we started, from working with the CRO on-site to working on boat engines as well as traveling to the offshore terminal at NFE's floating storage and regasification unit, which in and of itself is amazing. Vax facts and more

NFE partnered with the American Chamber of Commerce (AMCHAM) in Jamaica and other corporate sponsors to host the Chamber's first COVID-19 webinar. The COVID-19 Vax Facts and More event featured a panel of experts who shared information about the virus and the vaccines.

Presenters included:

John McIntyre, Chargé d'Affaires at the U.S. Embassy in Kingston, who spoke about the embassy's advocacy for Jamaica and the Caribbean as a whole to receive vaccine supplies from the U.S. government;

Dr. Varough Deyde, Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Caribbean Regional Office, who spoke of the CDC's actions, reports, and response to the pandemic;

Dr. Melody Ennis, Director, Family Health Services, Ministry of Health and Wellness, Jamaica, who shared information about Jamaica's vaccine program; and

Dr. Javier Pérez-Fernández, Medical Director, Baptist Hospital Critical Care Unit, Florida, who provided statistics along with updates regarding the situation in southern Florida.


